The Rome Branch of the Dante Alighieri Society

is situated in the XVI century Palazzo Firenze. The Branch was founded in 1889, the same year in which the 'Dante Alighieri' was established. The Society was begun by a group of people motivated by common cultural and humanitarian interests.

Their purpose was to safeguard and to diffuse the Italian language and culture, as well as to keep alive the love for Italian culture among foreigners and Italians throughout the world.

Over the years, men of culture have assumed its presidency, each one leaving the mark of his own personality. The long and intense history of the Branch runs parallel to events which have characterized the cultural development of Italy.

Over the years, the Rome Branch has assumed a growing, significant importance in the spread of Italian language and culture.

Such promotional activities take place, first of all, as the result of a constant commitment to the organization of Italian language courses for foreigners, as well as courses in culture for both Italian and foreign members of the Branch. The high quality of these courses is perfectly in line with the needs of the students.

In addition, the Rome Branch initiates interesting cultural events in collaboration with several secondary schools in Rome and awards scholarships to students of the Dante Alighieri Society based in foreign countries. Besides attending courses, the students, as members of the Society, will receive a membership card which allows them to:

- participate in the activities of the Dante Alighieri Society,
- take advantage of the conventions drawn up by the Central Presidency,
- obtain reductions on ticket prices for shows at Rome's Teatro Valle,
- obtain discounts at some bookstores,
- participate in organized excursions and cultural visits,
- Renaissance frescos and with a view of the garden of Palazzo Firenze, they can receive from the library staff assistance and advice in the selection of books:

All these advantages make the Rome Branch of the Dante Alighieri Society the most popular Studies Center in Rome for students coming from all parts of the world.



PROGRAM OF ITALIAN LANGUAGE COURSES

Italian language courses are divided into 6 levels:
BEGINNERS (A1) - ELEMENTARY (A2) - INTERMEDIATE (B1) - UPPER INTERMEDIATE (B2) - ADVANCED (C1) - POST-ADVANCED (C2).

At the end of each course the student will have the competency expected by the corresponding level of the Common European Framework for Languages (A1, A2, B1, B2, C1, C2).

BEGINNERS COURSE: for absolute beginners.

Program: pronunciation, spelling, first elements of language structure, reading and dictation, simple conversation, simple composition, simple video and audio comprehension.

ELEMENTARY COURSE: for advanced beginners.

Program: language structure, reading and dictation, short compositions, conversation on every-day matters, video and audio comprehension.

INTERMEDIATE COURSE: for students who already have some knowledge of the language.

Program: language structure, reading, dictation, composition, conversation, video and audio comprehension.

UPPER INTERMEDIATE COURSE: for students who already have a good knowledge of the language.

Program: completion of language structure, elements of syntax, reading, dictation, composition, conversation, video and audio comprehension.

ADVANCED COURSE: for students who already have a very good knowledge of the language.

Program: review of the principal topics of language structure, systematic study of syntax, reading of newspaper articles and passages of contemporary Italian literature, dictation, composition, video and audio comprehension.

POST-ADVANCED COURSE: for students who have a near complete knowledge of the language.

Program: review and in-depth study of the main rules of language structure and syntax, reading of newspaper articles and passages of contemporary Italian literature, oral and written exercises, video and audio comprehension.

CONVERSATION COURSE:

Conversation on topics pertaining to current events and every-day life in Italy.



Information

Before enrolling in language courses, non-beginning students will be able to take a placement test.

The lessons are conducted in Italian. A one hour lesson lasts for 50 minutes. No diploma or certificate is required for admission.

The school will be closed:

- for Christmas holidays from 23 December to 3 January (the lessons missed will be made-up),*
- during the month of August,*
- during the following civil and religious holidays: 1 November, 8 and 26 December, 6 January, 9 and 25 April, 1 May and 29 June.*

Lessons coinciding with these dates will not be made-up.



CALENDAR OF ITALIAN LANGUAGE COURSES

The courses take place from 5 September 2011 to 27 July 2012 according to the following calendar:

STANDARD

Length: 32 hours for 2 months - 2 hours twice a week.

Levels: BEGINNERS - ELEMENTARY - INTERMEDIATE - UPPER INTERMEDIATE - ADVANCED - POST-ADVANCED.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 9 to 11 a.m.

Starting: first days of October - December - February - April - June.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 6 to 8 p.m.

Starting: first days of September - November - January - March - May.

After the Advanced course it is possible to take an optional final exam.

SEMI-INTENSIVE

Length: 48 hours for 1 month - (from Monday to Thursday). 3 hours four days a week.

Levels: BEGINNERS - ELEMENTARY - INTERMEDIATE - UPPER INTERMEDIATE - ADVANCED - POST-ADVANCED.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 3 to 6 p.m.

Starting: 5 September - 3 October - 2 November - 1 December - 4 January - 1 February - 5 March - 2 April - 2 May - 4 June - 2 July. Starting from Intermediate level, a video and a culture lesson are included in the course.

During the last lesson of Semi-intensive courses students can take an optional final exam.

In December only, the Semi-intensive courses will take place from Monday to Friday.

INTENSIVE

Length: 64 hours for 1 month - (from Monday to Friday).

3 hours 3 days a week + 3 and a half hours 2 days a week.

Levels: BEGINNERS - ELEMENTARY - INTERMEDIATE - UPPER INTERMEDIATE - ADVANCED - POST-ADVANCED.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. 3 days and from 11 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. 2 days.

Starting: 5 September - 3 October - 2 November - 1 December - 4 January - 1 February - 5 March - 2 April - 2 May - 4 June - 2 July.

Starting from Intermediate level, a video and a culture lesson are included in the course. During the last lesson of Intensive courses students can take an optional final exam.

In December only:

Intensive courses will be organized in: 48 hours of Italian language (Monday to Friday, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.) + 16 hours of conversation (two days a week from 9 to 11 a.m. - optional for non-scholarship holders).



COURSES OF 84 HOURS

GRAMMAR + CONVERSATION:

INTENSIVE COURSE

Length: 64 hours for 1 month - 3 hours 3 days a week + 3 and a half hours 2 days a week.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. 3 days and from 11 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. 2 days.

+ CONVERSATION COURSE

Length: 20 hours for 1 month - 2 hours or 2 and a half hours twice a week.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 9 to 11 a.m. and from 3:30 to 6 p.m.

GRAMMAR + CULTURE:

INTENSIVE COURSE

Length: 64 hours for 1 month - 3 hours 3 days a week + 3 and a half hours 2 days a week.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. 3 days and from 11 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. 2 days.

+ HISTORY OF ART & ITALIAN HISTORY COURSE

Length: 20 hours for 1 month - 2 hours twice a week.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 9 to 11 a.m.

POST-ADVANCED COURSES OF 16 HOURS

Length: 16 hours for 1 month - 2 hours twice a week.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 9 to 11 a.m.

Starting: first days of October - November - December - January - February - March - April - May - June - July.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 6 to 8 p.m.

Starting: first days of September - October - November - December - January - February - March - April - May - June - July.

CONVERSATION COURSES

Length: 20 hours for 1 month - 2 hours or 2 and a half hours twice a week.

Levels: BEGINNERS - INTERMEDIATE - ADVANCED.

- ➔ **Class hours:** from 9 to 11 a.m. and from 3:30 to 6 p.m.

Starting: first days of September - October - November - December - January - February - March - April - May - June - July.

PREPARATORY COURSES FOR THE P.L.I.D.A. TEST

Length: 24 hours - 12 lessons of 2 hours each.

Levels: A1 - A2 - B1 - B2

Length: 30 hours - 10 lessons of 3 hours each.

Levels: C1 - C2

The Greeks, The Etruscans, The Romans: A Comparison of 3 Civilizations.

Length: 20 hours for 1 month – Tuesday and Thursday.

➔ Class hours: from 9 to 11 a. m.

Starting: 4 October – 3 November – 1 December – 5 January – 2 February – 6 March – 3 April – 3 May – 5 June.

The Seventeenth Century in Rome: Caravaggio, Bernini, Borromini, Pietro da Cortona.

Length: 16 hours for 2 months – Wednesday.

➔ Class hours: from 9.30 to 11 a.m.

Starting: 5 October – 7 December – 1 February – 4 April.

From the Renaissance to Mannerism.

Length: 16 hours for 2 months – Monday.

➔ Class hours: from 4 to 6 p.m.

Starting: 3 October – 5 December – 6 February – 2 April.

The History of United Italy, from 1861 to the First World War.

Length: 16 hours for 2 months – Wednesday.

➔ Class hours: from 11 to 1 p.m.

Method of enrolling in the course

Non EU students

To enrol it is necessary to pay the registration fee of € 40.00 valid for the whole academic year (5 September 2011 - 27 July 2012) as well as the fee for each course you wish to attend. The payment of fees can be done at the Secretary's office or from abroad at any local bank by means of a credit transfer made out to:

The credit transfer must be done with no charge to the payee. Upon receipt of the fee, the school administration will send a registration certificate which will confirm the period of attendance chosen by the student. This will facilitate requests for the necessary visa to enter Italy. The school administration is unable either to obtain visas or residence permits (permessi di soggiorno) for students or to provide help in finding employment of any kind in Italy.

On the other hand the school is willing to help students, on their arrival at the school, to find suitable accommodations, usually with a family.
